Opportunity Youth Center

Priority Population:

- 16-18 year olds who have been disengaged from school for at least 30 days
- Co-enrollment with Academic Pilot Program (APP)--program at Olympic and Independent studies program. Approximately 14 students in program needing wrap around services to ensure success.
- Outreach to Homeless and Foster Youth (WIOA Enrolled Youth Program Year 16-17: 62 Enrolled
 - 29% Foster Youth
 - 24% Homeless Youth
 - 40% in Special Education
 - 45% English Language Learners

OYC Services Provided:

- Case Manager (WBL Coordinator) will meet with youth regularly to ensure youth are on track for educational and employment goals
- Credit Recovery and Academic Counseling
- Mental Health Services
- Career Readiness Workshops and Career Exploration
- Referral to other services in the community
- Life Skills Workshops
- Paid Work Experiences, Internships and Summer Jobs
- Transitional Support--Connecting to post-secondary education/trades/apprenticeship programs/job leading to livable wages

Youth Center vs. Satellite location

- Youth need to feel a sense of community in a safe place where they feel connected. Satellite locations do not provide the relational connection needed for youth to feel committed
- Hub of services for youth. Regular access to support, becomes a protective factor for not dropping out of the program and safe place rather than being on the streets and getting involved in criminal activities
- Leadership Development: Youth take on leadership roles within the center which allows them to practice the skills that they are working on.
- Pursuing a satellite program in Bay Point

Visibility/Opportunity for More Funding

• There are grants and other funds that specifically support these type of community programs

Metrics of Success

- Credential/Diploma Attainment (Captured at the time of exit): WDB Goal: 51%, MDUSD: 80.5%
- Placement in Employment or Education (Captured after exit): WDB Goal: 60%, MDUSD: 72%

Number of Youth to be Served

- Workforce Investment and Opportunity Act (WIOA) Program Funded to serve a total of 65 youth
 - Total of 25 Out of School Youth
 - The center will serve many more than 25 youth.

Sustainability

- WIOA will pay for rent and majority of staff until June 30, 2020
- Increase WIOA funding over five years; \$180,000 2014-17, \$300,000 2017-20
- Pilot program for 3 years
- ADA can be collected on the youth who are under 18 years of age, which is the priority population. (ie: approximately 25 Youth at \$7500/student= \$187,500)
